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SOMETIMES IT JUST COMES DOWN TO YOU!

This column is going to be a combination of Motorist Awareness and Rider Education with a few rants and opinions thrown in for good measure. Be prepared—it just might strike a nerve! (Actually hoping that it does!)

So there I was the other morning riding my Wing to work, going the same route I have been using for the past 8 years and along came the perfect storm scenario.

I had just crested a small hill approaching a fourway intersection that is signal light controlled. A Marathon Gas station to my immediate right, a Church's Chicken caddy corner an abandon Walgreens to my left and a Family Dollar across the intersection on my right. A late model Nissan was passing through the intersection and moved into the left turn lane (for the opposite direction), turn signal on, to cross right in front of me and enter the gas station. I immediately backed off the throttle and figured they had to see me, no way were they going to cut in front of me, but alas they began the turn across my bow. (Nautical term-think Titanic)

The reality is I would have nailed that vehicle right in

the middle of the passenger side front door. Put a bull's-eye on it; because that was where I was headed. Pure reaction put me into the swerve maneuver, first left and then right (press left, press right) and by the thickness of a few of the hairs I have left on my head; cleared the vehicle. At this point I turned to look at my aggressor, the demon that failed to grant me the right of way, which was lawfully mine and I had every intention of swinging into the gas station and ripping this jerk a new one-conviction and righteousness were mine! I held the moral high ground. So I swung my head around realizing that all of this played out in a matter of seconds.

What vison greeted me was that of a very old man. Now at this point I realize all of us have a few years under our belts and I hate to use the "old" tag, but I am talking, in my humble opinion now, serious senior....fossil? I do not want to dive into the societal debate about when it is time to turn in the keys and surrender your independence, but that time should and will come for all of us. As if that is justification for the grievous, inexcusable offense. How many lives lost and serious injuries occur every year from exactly this situation?

At this point I realized there was nothing to gain by yelling at the guy. According to my daughter all of her friends are scared of me so I probably would have scared the heck out of this guy or worse and then I would have heard that "never saw me" line. (This would have fired me up even more!) No teachable moment here because his situation is not going to change. That was and is the true reality. I had survived. So I muttered a couple of not re-printable things and continued on to work. We in the motorcycling community need to have short memories so that we can keep our focus on the road. Distractions can be and are deadly!

A few columns ago I wrote about the number of registered motorcycles in the

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US, including more than two wheels, and that number is somewhere around 10 million. Let's error on the high side and say between, family, friends or maybe undercounted motorcycles and corresponding motorcyclist, the number comes to 25 million people involved with or aware of our passion. In the US alone we have a population of approximately 300 million. Looking at it another way 275 million people in the US do not ride or for the most part even think about motorcyclist. The odds are not in our favor. Remember every time we swing a leg across the seat we are accepting a perceived risk. We need to maximize everything we can possibly do to minimize that risk, but the reality is: The risk is always there! Trust me there are many aspects to this. Accept and learn. Don't be an ostrich and stick your head in the sand!

I am still a firm believer in Motorist Awareness and educating the "folks" of this world about; "Sharing the Road!" Steve Fagan and I wrote an Eighth Grade Middle School seminar, tied it into Federal and State Eighth Grade Science curriculum requirements, combining Motorist Awareness and Motorcycle Safety. It was, and still is, our heartfelt feeling that this important education needs to begin much earlier than the hormone driven, major distraction high school/driver education experience. (Do not get me wrong....it is good, but could be better...as in; used as a refresher to previously learned lessons.) It is no longer on the approved MA list. Yes it required effort, but isn't anything worth doing worth the effort?

Ask yourself this: How many high schoolers wave at you when you ride by? Yeah that is what I thought. Now, how many small/young children turn, stare and wave? Fire education starts at a young age, so should Motorist Awareness and Motorcycle Safety. Ingrain it while they are young and receptive. Heck put it on Sesame Street. Do it before they move into chasing girls or boys, chasing the independence of a driver's license and of course, hormones. It will change their perceptions and hopefully have an impact on the roads that we all share! Also, if you think about it, it is another way, a different approach if you will, to deliver the message to their parents, siblings and anyone else they interact with. Seriously, think about it! Does the argument possess merit?

Something as simple as allowing a young child to sit on our machines while interacting with them and their parents can make a lifelong impression. What are we talking about here? Five or ten minutes of our time? Is it time well spent? That one is hard to answer, but isn't it worth the possibility that it might be a life changing encounter? I challenge all of you to try it. What have you or for that matter the motorcycling community got to lose?



Now let's talk about Rider Education Riding Courses. I am sick to death of hearing: "I've been riding for 20 years (fill in the number that works for you) and never had an accident. So I don't need to take a course!" and "It would be a total waste of my time!" Here's the thing; Repetition is an excellent teacher, but only if the skill or training are done correctly. The scary thing is It can also reinforce bad, if not dangerous habits, skills and practices. Study after study, conducted both here in the US (Hurt Study) and

in Europe (M.A.I.D.S), continues to state that the "Motorcyclist failure to correctly; brake, corner and swerve" was the major contributing cause for the majority of serious or fatal motorcycling accidents. When is the last time you did any of the above mentioned maneuvers? Ever heard of the expression: "Use it or lose it?" So I am asking; when was the last time you seriously practiced those skills? Be honest!

I need all of you to take a hard look in the mirror and put vourself in that scenario. Would you have avoided the collision or ran right into the side of the car? As a Certified Motorcycle Ride Course Instructor I can tell you a couple of things. We in GWRRA have a gift. It is called Rider Education and Motorist Awareness. World class programs to help all of us to ride safer and because of that, for as long as we desire. Here in Georgia the Riding Courses and CPR/First Aid Courses costs are covered by the District. Instructors go out of their way to volunteer their time and resources. Lately it seems like they are taken for granted. No one wants to invest in supporting Rider Education or Motorist Awareness. Do not want to contribute to the fund raisers that make it possible or invest the time it takes to attend. What? Attend these potentially Life Saving Courses? "It's too far away", "It takes all day", "I have been riding forever and never had an accident, there is absolutely nothing you can teach me", "It's too hot", "It's too cold"....I could go on and on, but I believe you see my point or then again; maybe not.

Look at it this way I will use a sporting analogy since quite a few of us are sports fans. Football players and teams have been playing for years, yet they practice all the time. So do baseball, hockey, soccer, lacrosse teams... the list goes on and on. Not a sports fan? How about music than? Musicians have been playing an instrument for years. Why do they need to practice? What could they possibly learn? Who could teach them anything new?

I firmly believe that: "Arrogance can be fatal!" Usually the accident is caused by exceeding the abilities of the rider, not the machine. Again my opinion, but studies do seem to concur.


Hopefully I have made
